

#### Board Meeting Minutes, \_Richmond Quilters' Guild January 5, 2020 2:00PM Shady Grove UMC Church, Glen Allen, VA

President Sherry Whitford welcomed attendees and routed an attendance sheet; a quorum was confirmed.

**Reports:** Secretary – Anne Wright - The minutes were approved as published.

**Treasurer** – Shawne Kaeser – Current balance of \$9,024.24 reported for the guild account and \$11,055.64 reported for the quilt show account. Guild membership is currently 318; WE Quilt will be adding their 52 members to the Guild roster, noting that WE Quilts will be the second chapter for many of these members. An audit committee of Shawne Kaeser, Bobbie Stein, and Sherry Whitford were selected.

<u>Chapter Reports</u> - Brief updates from a representative of each chapter were made indicating increasing memberships, planned retreats, ongoing charity efforts and upcoming programs. Please note that James River Heritage reports they have changed their meeting start time from 7PM to 630PM

**Spring Meeting** – Nancy Buckland – Meeting will be March 28<sup>th</sup> at New Bethesda Church in Mechanicsville; Jim and Connie Thompson from Williamsburg will present a program "Floral Quilts". Lunch will likely be a boxed lunch with the afternoon program being "Quilt Bingo". Instructions on making the bingo blocks have been sent to the chapter program people, will be in the next TOT and posted on the Guild website..

The meeting was then adjourned.



Road and Signal Hill Road. Our program that evening will feature Haylie Zapantis who will be talking to us about indigo/fabric dying.



The program on February 5 will be "All Scrapped Out!," presented by Penni Domikis of Cabin in the Woods. Cabin in the Woods is a woman-owned small business in Fredericksburg VA. This program is a demonstration of how to make a masterpiece out of your unruly collection of scraps without pre-cutting or pre-pressing your fabrics. There is no need for pre-cut sizes. Designer Penni Domikis will show how to step away from the cutting table and ironing board and just begin sewing. There is no need to purchase special rulers... you will use YOUR rulers. There is no need to cut into your stash of yardage... you will use YOUR scraps and turn them into something spectacular. Using just a few rules of experience Penni will show how to make "free" quilts with all those leftovers others throw away.

On March 3 Louise Mooney will explain some ideas for clever fabric storage, a skill all of us can definitely use!

#### **Quilt Guild Bingo Game Card Instructions**

(Each fabric must be chosen from one of the following categories: batik, floral, geometric, heart, leaf, metallic, holiday, novelty, paisley, plaid, solid, star, stripe, or 1930s print. Use a black print for the center square.)

- 5 (2.5") squares assorted yellow and orange prints; 5 (2.5") squares assorted red prints
- 5 (2.5") squares assorted blue prints; 5 (2.5") squares assorted green prints
- 5 (2.5") squares assorted pink and purple prints;1 (2.5") square black print Block Assembly
- 1. Referring to photo, join 5 yellow/orange print squares to make one row
- 2. In the same manner make 1 red, 1 blue, and 1 green row.
- 3. Join 2 pink/purple squares. Make another pair of pink/purple. Join one pair to each side of a black square to complete the pink/purple row.
- 4. Join rows, placing the pink/purple row in the center to complete the block

From The Secret Lives of Color.





#### Avocado Green

#### Green,... Part II

"The Secret Lives of Color" book used several pages to just discuss Green in some detail and some of this was in the last issue of TOT. The author continued with separate sections about the following specific greens: verdigris, absinthe, emerald, Kelly green, Scheele's green, Terre verte, avocado, and celadon. Now, I'll dip into several of these, beginning with emerald.

The gem stone emerald is rare member of the beryl family which derives its color from small deposits of chromium or vanadium. Ancient Egyptians mined them from 1500 BC and set them in amulets and talismans. The Romans, thinking that because the color green is so prominent in nature it was restful and healthful for the eyes, actually ground up emeralds to make expensive eye balms. The infamous emperor Nero especially loved emeralds and had a large collection of them. It was said that he used an especially large emerald like sunglasses to protect his vision while watching gladiator fights. And L. Frank Baum in *The Wonderful Wizard of Oz* in 1900 used emeralds as both the building blocks and name for the fabulous city that Dorothy and her little band of friends marched toward. The Emerald City is a metaphor for the magical fulfillment of dreams.

You can't write about the color green without mentioning the Irish and Kelly green. Even the city of Chicago dyes its river water green to celebrate St. Patrick's Day each March. But the use of green by the Irish is a recent innovation beginning only about 1900. St. Patrick used the shamrock to help explain the trinity, but until the mid-1700s the color he was most associated with was blue. Irish loyalty shifted from blue to green as a protest against the anti-Catholic bias of William of Orange. A green flag with a golden harp became the symbol of Irish Home Rule. The Irish eventually adopted a tri-color flag with green for the Catholic nationalists, orange for the Protestants, and white for the peace they hoped would last between them.

Finally, avocado. This earthy color green, along with burnt orange and harvest gold swept the palettes of many consumer products during the growing concern for the natural world in the 1970s. Remember avocado-colored refrigerators? This color used in home decor now seems passé, but the appetite for the plant *Persea americana* has swelled to amazing proportions. Considered one of the few "healthy fats," avocado imports have ballooned. Avocado toast is the centerpiece of the eat-clean aspirational life style. In 2014 four billion avocados were consumed in America.

#### **Instructions:**

- · Quilt must not have been previously exhibited in a Richmond Quilters' Guild show.
- Each quilt entered *must have a four (4) inch sleeve and a fabric label with the owner's name*. Exception: No sleeve needed for quilts measuring less than 24" X 24"
- Complete one (1) "Quilt Entry Form" FOR EACH QUILT entered.
- Include a 4"X6" color photo showing the full quilt (or quilt top).
- On the back of the photo include quilter's name, name of quilt, and quilt dimensions.
- Deliver all quilts to the Commonwealth Building at the Richmond International Raceway on Thursday, October 15, 2020 from 8 AM 1 PM. Make sure you receive a claim ticket for EACH quilt entered.
- Quilts may be picked up AFTER 6:00PM on Saturday, October 17 after all quilts are taken down.
   No quilts will be released earlier. Quilt Claim Ticket will be required to verify quilt owner. If you are picking up for another quilter, you must have a letter and the claim ticket(s) from that quilter giving permission.
